# LOCATION INFORMATION

### **PARKING**

- Salmon Creek Regional Park has a main parking lot located near Klineline Pond and additional parking located at the sports fields. These are paid parking lots with fee stations. There are accessible parking spaces available in both locations.

### **RESTROOMS**

- Gender designated restrooms are located at Klineline Pond, and a single user restroom is located at the northwest side of the sports field parking lots (see map).

#### TRAIL ROUTES:

This map includes two trail routes that you can choose to explore:

- KLINELINE POND: Cross the bridge near the main parking area to explore the 0.75 mile network of paved trails located around Klineline Pond. Caution: this area includes uneven or damaged trail surfaces that may be challenging for wheelchairs, walkers, and other mobility devices.
- SALMON CREEK: Find this route along the main parking area or access it from the sports fields, and enjoy the 1 mile trail around the park. This route includes paved and gravel trail surfaces.

### **SALMON CREEK GREENWAY**

- The Salmon Creek Greenway Trail is a paved trail extending 3.1 miles from Klineline Pond to the Felida Bridge on NW 36th Ave. The trail meanders through forests, wetlands, meadows, and ponds along the banks of Salmon Creek.



# LOOKING

CLOSELY

Klineline Pond and the Salmon Creek Greenway are great places to watch wildlife.
Each season offers something different.



Bring binoculars on your trip and stop along your route to look up into the trees and along the creek or pond.
Whether you have binoculars or not, take some time observing the natural world around you.

## SALMON CREEK WATERSHED

A watershed is an area where rain and melting snow drain into a central waterway through small streams, creeks, and storm drains.

The Salmon Creek Watershed is 89-square miles in area, and includes the Cascade foothills and more urban areas. It drains into Lake River north of Vancouver Lake, eventually making its way to the Pacific Ocean.



## BIG LEAF MAPLE

- Look for the large leaves with pointed edges
- The leaves turn bright yellow in the fall



## COTTONWOOD

- Look for heart-shaped leaves that turn bright yellow in late autumn
- These tall trees grow quickly and thrive along rivers and wetlands


## DOUGLAS FIR
